WHAT IS TAW?

Founded in 1983, Theatre Artists Workshop (TAW) is an artistic incubator, a theatrical gymnasium, where theatre professionals hone their craft, stretch creative muscles, experiment, develop new plays, work with and get feedback from fellow artists away from the harsh glare of the public spotlight.

For 38 years, the Workshop has served its membership and audiences with that original vision still intact. Plays have been developed that have gone on to Broadway, Off-Broadway, Regional and even International production. Workshop performance and constructive critique have improved members' skills, and led to new opportunities. Audiences attend readings of classic and original plays, scenes and stories at the workshop theatre, local libraries and cultural institutions.

And once a year, TAW holds a festival of new works; a fundraiser production that is open to the public. Operating virtually due to the pandemic, this 2021 Spring festival is TAW's second virtual fundraiser. Next year, we will be back on the stage! Until then, we hope you enjoy this unique blend of theatre & film that we've developed during our year of workshopping within the Zoom art form.

A LETTER FROM TAW'S PRESIDENT

Dear TAW Community,

At that time, we had only recently been made aware of the pressing need to vacate our space, having been given 30 days' notice that our time at 5 Gregory had come to an end. Today, we have a couple of solid contenders for a new home and are close to raising the curtain on this, the next scene in the play of our organization's history. When we were producing *The Tawlight Zone*, we had no idea whether it would be several more weeks or several more months until we could see each other face-to-face. Now, we are optimistic that that day is close enough to hope for, even to plan for. Then, you could say, we were all the way down the rabbit hole. Now? We can just make out that beam of sunlight as we crane our necks skyward.

We have kept up the Monday night zoom meetings, continued our weekly board meetings, and strategized for our future. And, of course, we have created this, our second ever virtual fundraising festival.

While we know that the limitations of the virtual world have offered more than a few pain points along the way for us all, we have also discovered the contours of the medium, finding the unique creative opportunities that it provides. For this innovation and hard work, as well as all the technological advancements that have been made in the last two years, I'd like to acknowledge the efforts of Laura Thoma and Andrea Lynn Green. Thanks to their expertise and hard work, our organization is more efficient, more agile, and more accessible.

I'd also like to acknowledge the courage and efforts of our members, many of whom have not only made it through this brutal year, but who have created new work, refined existing work, and supported their colleagues in their efforts to do the same. The isolation and hardship of the pandemic has challenged us all just to survive. But as artists we know that when we create, we thrive.

TAW has an incredible legacy. Its founders and members – both past and present – are legendary. This organization has survived as long as it has due to the energy and vitality that all of its members have brought to the table. This board will always endeavor to honor the traditions of the past while keeping an eye on the future. We hope to continue to attract new artistic trailblazers, creators that will help us keep the work at TAW relevant, thought-provoking, and essential.

If 2020 was the darkened space of a rabbit warren, then 2021 must be light of the garden patch. With that in mind, I invite you to join us as we journey down the rabbit hole. After all, the only way out is through.


